Ideally Open forum discussion encouraged for dialogue from the members.

Noting a much better day than we had last year with 'Storm Darragh' in attendance inclusive of enduring a power cut in the village hall on the day. No incident to report this year.
2	Review of actions from previous annual general meeting

	Matters arising. - From points made to the Committee through that meeting & the annual year - Chair addressed points: - a) <i>Simon Pipe raised the point about the possibility of our website being altered for media content (present outline & format fixed by NEC central IT). Graham Jones has brought the question up to them through the 'Local Groups' Forum discussion. Answer = A new central IT manager and arrangement of common web pages by all local groups is presently being implemented by the NEC. A better understanding is likely to be achieved in 2026 with them.</i> b) <i>Committee member positions - Co-opting members could be considered if any roles or service in shortfall exists for the Group. Answer = Noted, and this year this has been forthcoming through Rubert Connelly on management of the Birmingham Canal Canter event & David Powell for catering. Also support through IT by Ian Kelsey.</i> Additional summary points made within the period: - c) The committee had undertaken monthly meetings (eight) this year for the benefit of members all recorded through minutes available via our website, also inclusive of the 'WhatsApp' LDWA HoE Group for improved communication.

4	Treasurer's report Yvonne Court as treasurer:- With the support of dedicated volunteers H of E has delivered two successful challenge walks and manned a checkpoint on the Flower of Suffolk 100. I volunteered at checkpoints on these events and thoroughly enjoyed being involved in all of them. I would recommend that any member that hasn't volunteered on an event, do so at least once, it allows members to see what it takes to run a challenge event. The H of E checkpoint for the Flower of Suffolk 100 received some great feedback for 'The bistro in the barn' with many walkers commenting on the welcoming sight of lights leading to the barn and the support they received from all the team. As treasurer it was my aim to ensure volunteers expenses and bills incurred were paid promptly. I hope I achieved this. The layout of the accounts has been changed this year to help members understand where the group is heading and add transparency to the expenditure. Last year's and this year's figures are now shown side by side. Statement of Financial Activities

Birmingham Canal Canter - income was down £1,855.90 on 2024. BCC received 226 entries (including some cancellations) in 2025, 89 entries less than 2024.

Midsummer Malvern Marathon - income was down £635.24 on 2024. MMM received 223 entries (including some cancellations) in 2025, 43 entries less than 2024.

The group received £565 from the Martyn Greaves Fund via the NEC towards the cost of First Aid training and £500 from the Flower of Suffolk 100 in recognition of the support provided.

Equipment held by H of E was assessed during the year and brought up to standard for use on F of S 100 and future challenge events.

Balance Sheet

A note has been added to the balance sheet to allow a reserve of £3,600 to be set aside from available funds. This is to be used if an event needs to be cancelled at short notice.

The need for such a contingency was highlighted recently with the cancellation of the Long Mynd Hike the evening prior to the event taking place. Due to Storm Amy, it was agreed by the organisers the event would be unsafe for entreats and volunteers.

If given the opportunity I will happily continue to support the group in the role of treasurer and will continue to offer support to allow challenge walks to take place.

Other Committee - Officers reports

- From The Chair - **Clive Wainwright** overview:-

It gives me great pleasure to present my report as Chairman of the Heart of England LDWA Group for this past year.

Membership & Participation

Our membership continues to thrive, with new faces joining us from across the region. It's been heartening to see such enthusiasm for long-distance walking, whether on our weekend social walks or through our challenge events. Attendance has been mixed for social walks this year, although for those in participation the camaraderie among members is a testament to the spirit of the group.

Walks & Events

Over the past year, we've completed 21 organized social walks, covering various lengths of activity. Our calendar has tried to offer something for everyone—from gentle 14-mile routes to more demanding 20-mile endurance walks. Challenge events - Highlights include the support of the annual 100 miles LDWA national event in Suffolk, checkpoint 5 at Parham

(see Strider August magazine) together with member support on the 'A Coventry Way' event. Plus again fulfilling our traditional challenge events we put on in the area be it the 'Malvern Midsummer Marathon' & the "Birmingham Canal Canter".

Special thanks to our walk leaders and committee organisers who've planned routes, coordinated logistics, and ensured safety throughout. Their dedication is the backbone of our success.

Training & Safety

We've continued to promote safe walking practices, with completed courses on first aid, refresher sessions on navigation, and gear preparation. I'm proud to report zero major incidents this year—a credit to our collective vigilance and preparation.

Community & Outreach

We've strengthened ties with local walking groups and supported the national committee through the 'Local Groups' committee meetings, together with adjacent LDWA groups' support.

Looking Ahead

Next year, we aim to expand our walk offerings, introduce a mentorship scheme for new members, and explore potential taster walks for newcomers. We'll also be reviewing our constitution and policies to ensure they reflect our evolving needs. However, development always needs the input of member support in volunteers & participation.

Thanks & Acknowledgements

It's been a very enjoyable and rewarding period for me as acting Chairman in the last four years, as I am standing down post this AGM I trust my future successor also finds satisfaction in running an excellent Group.

I want to extend heartfelt thanks to the committee, volunteers, and every member who's contributed to the group's success. Your passion, reliability, and good humour make this group what it is.

Let's keep walking, keep exploring, and keep supporting one another. Warm regards and thank you.

- **Neil Bromley** as Deputy Chairperson :-

As usual, my role as Deputy Chair has this year involved picking up some of the scraps that fall from the tables, laden with formal responsibilities, belonging to my fellow committee members. Most of these scraps related to finding a new HQ for the Malvern Midsummer Marathon and then sorting out a revised route description for each of the two events.

After considering some less-than-ideal alternatives, Colwall Village Hall turned out to be a near-perfect venue in terms of location and facilities. More problematic was the re-writing of the route descriptions. Our Secretary had helpfully suggested new routes for the two events, both of which would have involved walkers crossing two different cricket squares at mid-afternoon on a Saturday in June – prime time for a cricket match! Fortunately, the grounds staff at Colwall Cricket Club and The Elms School couldn't have been more helpful in devising new routes that saved our walkers from the threat of being clobbered by the village fast bowler or a schoolboy batsman hitting a six.

I had thought that re-writing the routes to take walkers in a clockwise direction, rather than the normal anti-clockwise one, would be an easy desk exercise - as easy as changing a compass bearing of 90° to 270°, for instance. In practice, it meant starting from scratch as, oddly enough, everything looks different in reverse! All seemed to work well on the day, with all walkers managing to get back to HQ successfully.

- Supporting members who wish to develop the confidence to lead social walks, offering guidance and assistance as needed

- **Mike Buckley** as present Membership Secretary :-

Firstly, I'd like to thank everyone for their continued trust and support in allowing me to serve as Membership Secretary. I am happy to continue in this role if re-elected and am always here to help or advise new members with any questions they may have.

As members of the Heart of England group, thank you for being part of the LDWA, and for choosing our group which was formed in 1996. And is now approaching 30 years. Next year there will be extra celebrations.

We are one of the larger groups currently with 497 members. There are several reasons for choosing us, mainly for HoE social walks but also -

- challenge walks by other LDWA groups
- a hundred mile walk set annually but a qualifier completed first
- using our GPX files which identify routes
- information provided in STRIDER 3x per year
- social walks by other LDWA groups

and for many people, who enjoy being and helping as marshals in one of our challenge walks, currently the Malvern Midsummer Marathon and the Birmingham Canal Canter.

"Some local groups also organise social evenings such as pub suppers, quiz nights and local planning evenings - something to keep you out of mischief on those dark winter nights when you can't go walking. Some groups enjoy weekends or short holiday breaks together, sharing their common interest in walking and travel. Some venture far outside their local patch, incorporating trains and boats and planes!" - Clive, our Chair.

Members can find our walks program in STRIDER, or more updated in the online website ldwa.org.uk. And although some choose not to receive emails they are very useful and would not overburden you. Your personal details can be changed. And you can select from other groups as their associate members.

- **Graham Jones** as present Walks Secretary :-

It's been another good year for the Heart of England group, with a relatively full schedule, which saw us take part in:

20 Group social walks.

2 Challenge Walks, with their respective Marshals event.

2 Walks organised by Heart of England in support of the Local Groups Weekend in Leamington Spa.

1 AGM walk.

1 event at Go Outdoors

25 walks in total for the group, so nearly every other week.

It was pleasing to see two new walk leaders taking the reins – thank you to Paul Jennings and David Tame for their efforts.

A lot of the walks were led by three members - David Hood, Terry Muckell, and Clive Wainwright. Thanks to all of you for helping to keep a calendar of walks going.

Also, thanks to Anne Wade, and Richard and Sally Hicks for leading the Local Groups Weekend walks; and to Mike Buckely for organising the pre-AGM walk.

Next year is the Heart of England's thirtieth anniversary – an ideal opportunity for the group to revisit some popular walks they've done over the years, or to enjoy new walks.

The walks calendar relies on members to lead walks, or maybe to simply suggest a walk that somebody else is prepared to lead. It doesn't have to be 20 miles, or even a full day's walking – it could be a favourite walk you may want to share with the group. No offer of a walk will be declined.

Let's make our anniversary year a great one for walking.

- **Robin Richmond** as present Data Protection Officer :-

The HoE Committee continues to ensure that GDPR requirements are complied with fully in all areas of its operations and communications, based on advice from the GDPR Officer.

The main task of the GDPR Officer is to make an annual return to the NEC setting out H of E's compliance with GDPR requirements, i.e. the personal data held, the length of time it has been held, and its security. During this calendar year (2025) both the Social Event Registration form, which also has a GDPR content, and the GDPR User Guide have been subject to changes, which are not yet finalised. Therefore, H of E has proposed and the NEC has agreed that H of E will not make an annual return for 2024. The next annual return will be made for 2025 and the GDPR Officer's report will report on the outcomes at the December 2026 AGM.

- **Rupert Connolly** as present Equipment Officer: -

This is my first report as a member of the Heart of England LDWA Local group committee. I would like to thank you for all the support that has been given to me.

The role encompasses organizing the equipment to support the group activities.

What the equipment is.

An inventory of all the kit has been made – running to 174 lines ranging from Potato ovens and microwaves to fairy lights and Sail Banners. There are "Check point admin boxes and checkpoint cleaning kits. Cool boxes and bags and cool packs, first aid kits and tables and chairs. Urns, kettles and toasters. Plates, bowls and cutlery. Utensils for serving and cooking, chopping boards and sharp knives.

We have sufficient kit to run all the current challenge events we put on. With the range we have there is unlikely to be a great investment required if we put on different events of similar lengths. If we were to put on longer challenge events it is likely we would not need any extra equipment also. It would likely be more sensible to borrow from other nearby local groups rather than increase the storage requirements of our group.

Where it was used in 2025.

A Coventry Way - One Outdoor Check point (Gazebos, Tables, Chairs, Water Carriers, Admin/Cleaning boxes) & Sail banners at HQ

Flower of Suffolk – 100 - Barn Dressing (Tables, Chairs, Gazebos, Fairy Lights, Bunting, Kettles & Urns, Water carriers– 2 Toasters – We took more than normally would be the case to the 100 as we wanted to make the barn more comfortable for us and the entrants to the event.

Malvern Midsummer Marathon - HQ/4 indoor CP and one water station

Birmingham Canal Canter - HQ/4 outdoor CP and 1 indoor CP

Local Groups Weekend - Sail Banners

What was replaced.

This year much of the purchasing was to replace equipment that had become damaged over the years (Gazebos and Tables). The volunteers on our challenge events were presented with T-Shirts with the H of E logo on in recognition of their generous contribution. Bunting and fairy lights were purchased.

Where it is stored.

Stored in a variety of garages/spare rooms

Investigation into hiring a garage from Birmingham City Council has led to nothing. It is likely they are looking to sell the garages so are not actually taking on any new tenants.

Commercial self storage units are prohibitively expensive and over specified for our needs.

Options for the future

Work will continue in trying to identify a long term easily accessible economic storage solution.

Some of the equipment is not used on an annual basis it may be appropriate to consider disposing of this.

Investigate what other equipment could support the H of E group and the LDWA in general. As new events work to endeavour to produce an archive for each event to facilitate the ease of running them in future years.

- **Ian Kelsey** as present IT Officer: -

Overview

The IT function continues to play a vital role in supporting the Heart of England group's activities by ensuring accurate and timely communication, maintaining digital platforms, and providing technical support for events.

	Key Achievements Website Maintenance & Updates - Updated the LDWA H of E website with walk listings, event details, and news. - Added photo galleries and reports from major walks and challenge events to keep content fresh and engaging. Event Support - Provided technical assistance for challenge events, including online entry forms and GPX route file distribution. - Supported walk leaders with digital resources to improve participant experience. Challenges - Occasional delays in receiving walk details, which impacted timely updates. Plans for Next Year - Explore options for social media presence to increase engagement. - Encourage members to use photo galleries and event reporting features to showcase group activities. Acknowledgements I would like to thank all committee members and walk leaders for their cooperation in providing timely information and feedback. Your support has been invaluable in ensuring smooth IT operations throughout the year.

Questions and Any other Business

Points raised at the meeting:-

- Rupert Connolly confirmed he would be organising the re-establishment of the Forest Marathon in September 2026, likely to be Saturday 26th, in conjunction with the support help of David Powell & Simon Pipe with the aim of global support of H o E members also. Start at Henley Village Hall. Two distances presently proposed (27 miles & 20 miles). Outcome on any proceeds made intended to make a donation to HoE Forest.
- The Group also intends to develop a 50 mile event in our area for 2027.
- A rota arrangement of our existing or new challenge events for 2027 is likely to be in place, as a maximum of three challenge events is in the capacity of the committee to organise.
- Rupert also mentioned to the attendees he would like to develop another annual 100 mile LDWA event in our area (principally incorporating the Malvern's & Cotswolds) to suit the NEC requirements possibly for 2029. This time encompassing the total support of the HoE Group committee, but independently team lead for management. Noting no adverse comment was received from the audience on this statement, but further discussion needs to be processed through the committee, ultimately involving long term planning if this is to become a reality.
- Rupert also talked through the situation with the Bristol & West Group, which now unfortunately ceases to exist as a Group. NEC asked our Group and adjacent local groups for support and accommodating its present members for any amalgamation that could be achieved. In final outcome of practical location and debate via the committee we are inheriting members with a postcode of Bristol & Gloucester if they wish to join our HoE group. Although this expands our present landscape of our HoE zone it supports members without a present home. Future Leaders & walks will therefore be taken into consideration to cover the area.
- Elizabeth Connolly based on the above statement, mentioned it would be good if we as a Group could organise a "welcoming social walk" for them early in the new year. Graham as walk secretary to review accordingly.
- The committee mentioned with approx. 70% of its Group membership over the age of 60 and more likely to be retired, the planning of midweek social walks was a consideration with the prominent days of Wednesday or Thursday being an outcome if achieved. Noting any leaders from the membership always welcome & support given via our walk's secretary Graham if on offer. Due to planning or time lag note the use of 'Strider Magazine' is only likely to have prominent registered challenge events or definite social walks listed. As communication is always the key, its prudent to always look on our website & 'Whats App' Group for last minute walk listings or meet ups.
- The attendees raised the question to the committee was all nominated roles necessary to be full committee members in their capacity role e.g. Data Protection Officer, IT officer. Reply from committee & on balance with our present constitution & co-opting people it was thought no change required.
- As next year will be the Groups 30th anniversary the committee have developed the Birmingham Canal Canter challenge event to have an extended distance of 30 miles incorporated into its traditional distances available for entry. Mike Buckley will also produce some background wording to our website to acknowledge our Groups history – keep a lookout on website in 2026.
- Terry Muckle raised the question will the Committee consider the "Heart of England Way" walking route again (as it was 2002 since we last fulfilled undertaking) in the social calendar. Reply from the Committee acknowledged this fact, and it was long overdue for re-walking, especially for new members.

Committee to review in 2026 in committee meetings & implications how this could be achieved in planning and time scaling of dates.
