PAST EVENTS AND WALKS

In our build up to Christmas we had some very nice social walks. The first was the Chairman's Choice and Dan managed to find a route weaving through scrubby land which was surprisingly devoid of mud for the autumn, at least in the first part of the walk. The first pool mud we came across was the silt dredged from the canal which had been left on the towpath. At this point one of our more ardent mud larks got so excited he got down and rolled in it. Dan's full report appears later.

Bill Grace found a very rural walk for the Thames Tramp considering the start was on the Thames towpath just opposite Fulham Football Club. Going down the towpath, the 13 walkers (including 3 from Essex/Herts) passed several riverside pubs who purvey the delicious product of a local brewery at Wandsworth. It was only when we left the river that we found pubs selling an inferior brew and much to my surprise, it was outside one of these establishments that our leader declared the lunch stop. I have since put Bill right on how to plan a walk. In the afternoon we went via Richmond Park and a Wimbleless Wimbledon Common to get back to the starting point on the towpath just before dark.

Good conditions were rather transitory for the 8 walkers who came to Fossdale for the Hurtwood Hunt. We set off east in the thick snow but found ourselves inside the village the IV at Albury Heath just over an hour later. We then continued on to St Martha's Hill before descending to Albury to enjoy the hospitality of the Drummond Arms.

In the afternoon we ascended the slope to the North Downs via the Silent Pool. Some walkers (probably feeling the effect of the beer) began to get a little frivolous by shaking the trees so the snow fell on their colleagues as they peered underneath. After passing Hollister, we came off the downs into Gomshall for another stop in the Old Mill tea house. On in the dark back to the Hurtwood Inn at Fossdale for dinner. All 35 who had booked the meal attended in spite of the bad weather and declared they had a very nice evening. Very well organized by Chris Steer and Tony Youngs. The checkpoints were very good.

The transition to event conditions started immediately after Christmas with Ralph Henley's Winter Windsor Wender. This can be a walk or a run as the fancy takes one. Most of the 18 walkers took it so easy that the organizer suspects there was an unofficial checkpoint at the Fox and Hounds at Bishopsgate. The runners, not to be outdone, got back in time to sample the delights of the Petters Social Club bar. While on the run in Windsor Great Park they maintained the Royal family came out to see them, but it may be just coincidence that the cars were emerging from Royal Lodge as the runners passed. Ralph intends organizing this delightful event just after Christmas again this year.

The Surrey Inns Hunter continued the transition with Keith Chatterton again selecting some fine routes. 43 finished the 18 mile course while another 69 did the 12 mile course. Keith is trying to introduce some more challenging features into the event but I feel using a gate as a gate in the 100 meters square which must boast the most gates in an equivalent area in Surrey, is asking for a variety of answers. Also the idea of counting fir trees with golf balls whistling round your ears is likely to increase the mortality rate. As usual there were a number of pubs en route to tempt the weaker minded.

To complete the transition we had to wait for three weeks longer than anticipated with the postponement of the Winter Turners due to bad weather. When it did get under way, 97 started from Leatherhead Football Club and 32 got back before the checkpoint was finished. The route included the path over Betchford Down which had recently been cleared by Surrey Group members. If the summer event on 4th July has comparable weather, entrants will be rewarded with some very fine views of central Surrey.

BLATCHFORD DOWNS PATH CLEARANCE

About 25 Surrey Group members attended each of the scheduled path clearance days on Betchford Down to hack away mainly at Yew bushes and Hawthorn bushes, thus transforming an impenetrable jungle into a very pleasant sunken track.

The activities were under the supervision of Nigel Davies, the local National Trust warden who told us some interesting facts about the countryside during the course of the operations.

We made a 3rd visit to Betchford Down to do our allotted bit of opening up the views in January and there is another visit planned for Saturday 27th February to finish the job. See programme.

Having cleared the path, we must not allow it to get overgrown again so further "tidy up" work parties will be arranged as necessary.

FILMING 100/100+

My thanks to all those members who have offered to help on the LDWLT's 1982 big one following my speech in the October Report.

Naturally I can still do with a few more, so if you are not walking and have a few hours to spare over the Spring Bank Holiday (last weekend in May) I would appreciate your letting me know.

Report on the Chairman's Choice social walk
Sunday 25th October 1981

The morning started very bright. With sunshine and a reasonable weather forecast we were led to believe that the morning would be dry and the afternoon showery with some sunny periods.

We were 20 in number including 4 from the Sussex Group, Sue Coles, Richard Hatchings, Richard and Sandra Brown.

Distribution of the Surrey Group newsletter by John Westcott delayed the start a little but we finally moved off at 9.45.a.m.

The route took us northwards through Farnham Park with a view through distant trees of the gnometer at Albury. After passing through Upper Hale, we descended to Cavers' Camp, an iron age and Roman camp site. A pause here to enjoy extensive views of Farnborough airfield, Guildford Cathedral, Biggs Buck, Crooksbury Hill and the gnometer at Albury again.

As we dropped down and headed for Twyford race course, the first spots of rain began to fall from clouds that built up from the NW. At Fleet pond, waterproofs were given an airing as the rain was by now getting heavy. So much for that weather forecast and it was only 10.45.a.m. After leaving the pond, we had a section of the Basingstoke canal to cover. Here the canal passes close to the town of Fleet, Richard and Sandra Brown left us to return home. The party continued along the towpath to the lunch stop, a canal side pub at Crookham. We spent about an hour in the hostelry and almost forgot the rain which was to continue into the late afternoon. At this point Sue Coles and Richard Hatchings left us to take a short route back.

Back out in steady rain, we carried on along the towpath towards Odilham. The bridges over the canal allow this section have been restored by the Surrey and Kent canal society. We left the canal at Broadbrook. The mud had not been too bad up to now but the remainder of the walk made up for that. Even so, one or two complained about the lack of ploughed fields.

After viewing from the trig point on Horseshoe common, we descended to encounter a rather muddy track, a fallen tree and a sunken path which resembled a stream. A short stop at Great Hall Church and then through the gathering darkness back to Farnham. Needless to say the rain has stopped now.

The route was my choice but the weather most certainly was not. Everyone said they enjoyed themselves. We will do it again and perhaps get fine weather.

SATURDAY 27th Feb 1982: BLATCHFORD DOWN PATH CLEARANCE. (187) All Surrey Group members who can make it are asked to come along to help finish the clearance of this ancient bridleway going diagonally across Blatchford Down centring on GR 103487. Main party will meet at 9.45.a.m. at A25/TQ126 junction in Shinger Hammer GR 096476 (limited car parking available here). Tools will be provided but assistance will be needed to carry them to the operational site. There will be plenty of tea but please bring your own food. Those who cannot make it by 9.45 are welcome to come along later but as there is little parking available in Shinger Hammer it may be better to use the White Downs Road car park GR 115493. Finish about 4.30.p.m.

SUNDAY 14th Mar 1982: CISSBURY CIRCUIT (198), 22 miles on the South Downs. Lunch at Washington. "But the swipes they take in at the Washington Inn / is the very best beer I know" (Milsair Below). Meet 9.30.a.m. in the car park at TQ 129077, (turn east off A24 into May Tree Avenue at "Cissbury Ring Free Car Park" sign just within the Worthing boundary; first left up Storrington Rise to car park). SAT-SUN 27/28 Mar 1982: TANNERS HINDHEAD AND RINGDOWN (186 + 187). A chance to walk the 26 miles between these two Surrey Youth hostels and back again the following day if you so wish. You can start from Tanners (GR 140515) or Hindhead (GR 894368) on the Saturday but from Hindhead only on the Sunday. Details from Graham Puddie.

SAT-SUN 3/4 Apr 1982: SURREY SUMMITS (186 + 187). The Surrey group's big one. Hundred Kilometer challenge walk over the popular hills of central and western Surrey. Start at 10.a.m. from Witley. GR 947394. Details from John Westcott.

SUNDAY 23rd May 1982: BLATCHFORD DOWN WALK AND PICNIC (186 + 187) Walks starting from Wisley Common in the South, Cranleigh in the South, Headley Heath in the East and Guildford in the west all converging on Blatchford Down for a mass picnic. For the more energetic Bryan Alden will be leading a run from Wisley and for the less energetic there will also be a short family walk from Runmore Common. Thursday 3rd June 1982: PROGRAMME PLANNING MEETING at the Leg of Mutton and Cauliflower, The Street Ashtead. 7.30.p.m. for 8.

SATURDAY 12th June 1982: EMBURST 100 Run (187). A road run of 100 miles with an 18 hour time limit. 10 x 10 mile laps. Starting from Emburst Village Hall GR 091403 at 6.a.m. Details from Graham Piddin.

SUNDAY 13th JUNE 1982: COACH TRIP TO THE PURBECK PLUG (195). It is hoped to arrange a coach for Surrey members who would like to take part in this picturesque Dorset Walk if there is sufficient support. The coach will start at Sutton with a stop at Guildford and one or two other points (according to demand) in between. The walk is only 23 miles but it should not be underestimated because the cliff walking in the early stages is a little more than undulating. From Swanage the route goes along the sea to Kimmeridge Bay then inland via the Purbeck hills back to Swanage.
