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THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - 26th January 1984

17 members attended.

The statement of account for year ended 31st December 1983 was agreed. A copy of the statement is being sent to all members with this newsletter. Of the £231.44 balance, up to £100 has been allocated for further equipment which has not yet been purchased.

Don Hatfield, John Westcott and Dave Challenger were elected Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Don for the 4th successive year and John and Dave both starting their 6th term of office.

It was decided to make donations of £10 to the National Trust and £20 to the National Trust. In addition it was decided to donate the profits from the 1984 Solidford Boundary Walk to the Solidford Bowls. Further information concerning these donations is given later in this newsletter.

The meeting agreed, in principle, that the group should obtain an electric typewriter, mainly for the secretary's use, and funds be accumulated with this objective in mind. Having made decisions, it was thought hardly appropriate to suggest "levying up" for equipment but as our main income was profit from events, organisers were asked bear these commitments in mind when fixing the entry fees.

DONATIONS TO OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

Two things have happened recently prompting the secretary to seek the approval of the meeting on 26th January to make donations to voluntary organizations whose objectives are to cater for the cross country walkers needs. The first is that the Southern Regional Controller of the National Trust, during correspondence with the secretary, had suggested that a donation should be forthcoming when an event is organized which goes across their properties. The second is that Peter Trafford Clark (the hon secretary of the Wrekin Control) was the guest speaker at our annual dinner.

It is very difficult, if not impossible, to organize a walk of LDWA standards to Central Surrey without going over land either owned or administered by these organizations and as far as the National Trust is concerned, the same can be said over the whole of Surrey. It should be remembered that not all paths used are rights of way and in any case I am sure you will agree the upkeep of footpaths over these areas is far above average. These organizations need donations from the public to do this work and I am glad to see the Surrey Group contributing to their funds.

The donation to the Guildford Scouts was agreed following a request from Barbara Blatchford. The donation is to help towards the building of their new hut which will include a "quiet room" called the Alan Blatchford Room. Prior to the Guildford Boundary Walk going under the banner of the LDWA, it was organized by the Late Alan Blatchford on behalf of the Guildford Scouts. In view of this connection it was thought appropriate to donate the profits of the 1980 to this project.

VENUE FOR OUR MEETINGS

We have had trouble in the past with our venue at the Ley of Matton and Castleflower being double booked and at that time we started to consider the possibility of holding our meetings elsewhere. At the suggestion of the landlord however we changed our nights from Tuesday to Thursday and that certainly seemed to solve the problem.

us have a nice large working party so that we can finish the path. - Finish

Sunday 25 March: BITONING DIVISION (1985). 22 miles on Roman roads, field paths
and paths - the oldest valley in Sussex (1889) and downland tracks. Real ale

- The metric classic. A 100 kilometre (62 miles) challenge walk over the

Witterings, GR 947204. Starts 9.30 a.m. Saturday and all to Finish by 12 noon on Sunday
(no hour time limit). Closing date for entries is 7th March. Details from John

Sunday 13 May: SPRING CHAIRMAN'S CHOICE (186). A 25 mile social walk starting from
the castle car park Farnham GR 834874 at 9 a.m. Route goes north via the
Ravenglass Canal to have lunch at the Rose and Thistle Farnham. In the
afternoon, Ash ranges will be crossed (hopefully) then via Horndown, Badshot Lee
and Farnham Park back to the starting point. Leader Dan Radfield.

Thursday 11 May: PROGRAMME PLANNING MEETING (175, 176 or 186). At Cobham Club

Thursday 25 June: WISDOM EVENING WALK (186 & 187). From 11. Thorpebank Guildford

Sunday 24 June: METAC walk (186 & 187). An easy 17 mile walk along the tow path of
the River Navigation from Godalming to the British Aerospace sports ground at
Maybridge. Starts from Godalming at 10 a.m. with a coach available leaving
Maybridge at 8.45 a.m. to transport walkers to the start. A place on the coach
must be booked in advance. The organiser says he will put the route description
right around the Guildford area this time, an inaccuracy which has been carried
forward for a number of years. Please note since the 1983 event the Petersham
to Wisley section of the RDS has been opened so we do not want anybody taking

Sunday 1 July: TANNERS MARATHONS (187). 50, 30 and 10 mile courses in central Surrey
starting and finishing at Leatherhead Football club, GR 163560. As reported in
the previous newsletter, this will be the 25th Tanners 50 with special blue and
silver certificates being awarded to walkers who complete the 50 (not the 30).
Free entry to anybody who took part in the first Tanners in 1960. Details from

Sunday 22 July: GRODING ABOUT GOAHLING (186). Meet at Godalming car park GR 973480
at 9.45 a.m. Roundabout-a 20 mile circular-walk of Godalming. Leader Merryn

Sunday 9 September: CHILTERN MARATHON (175). A 25 mile walk in the Chilterns starting and finishing at Marlow Rugby Club, GF 062803. Entries limited to 450. Details from Vicce Sefton.

Sunday 16 September: GUILDFORD BOUNDARY WALK (186). The now well established 21½ mile walk which follows approximately the pre 1974 boundary of Guildford Borough. Families and young walkers are particularly encouraged to take part. Start and Finish at Herley Fort, GF 052408. Details from Barbara Hatchford.

Friday to Sunday 28 to 30 September: DALES TRAILERSE (98). A minibus trip to Northern England to do the walks featured on pages 22 and 23 of Stride 36. The party to consist of members wanting bed and breakfast for 2 nights or using the Youth Hostel or camping at Nenthead Campsite. The fare will be approx £12 and five bookings are required with deposits by early spring. Bookings to George Harvey who will also book the bed and breakfast but you will have to make your own arrangement for camping or staying at the youth hostel.

THE HABAC FUN RUN LEAGUE

In addition to the foregoing programmes, the LIMA takes part in the Habac Fun Run League. There are 10 runs to be held in 1984 (2 of which have taken place) mainly cross country and usually between 4 and 6 miles, with a shorter distance, usually 2 miles, for juniors and joggers. The programme for 1984 has not yet been finalised, but future dates already fixed are:-

THE PEMBROKESHIRE WEEKEND - THREE WERE HARDLY A CROWD

In medieval times two pilgrimages to St David's equalled one to Rome. Why did so many Surrey Group members miss this opportunity of acquiring so much merit with so little effort.

The three, Dan Radfield, Tony Gaster and I, who took Merryn's Magic Minibus to the Pembrokeshire Coast Path set out early on Saturday morning 3 October along a splendid and varied coastline. The wildlife high spot was watching the seals and their yellow flared paps on the small beaches below the cliffs facing Skomer Island.

Merryn met us in the early afternoon, having transported all our gear to the second camp site, and led us onward along the coast path to Mutton Haven.

On the Sunday morning we heard jackdaws and a cow joining the Welsh voices from the purple stone cathedral of St David's set in its brilliant green hollow before setting out on a walk round the wild and beautiful landscape of St David's Head.

COMMONS CLAMP - MOSTLY RAIN AND MUD BUT FOODFOLLOW WAS SWEET

To be a native of Chobham, it is said that you must have webbed feet so it is probably best to see the village and its surroundings while it is raining to get a true atmosphere. If this philosophy is accepted, the day Chris Steer chose to hold his Commons Clamp Walk was certainly very suitable. It is the first LORR walk I have been on where it has rained continuously from start to finish.

There were one or two intrepid walkers who suddenly found they had other things to do when they saw the intensity of the rain but 14 hardened souls turned up at the Chobham Car Park for this gentle afternoon stroll. The main feature of the walk were Horsell and Chobham commons with a connecting path between the two going alongside Chobham International Airport. Walkers trudged through mud, paths lined to rivers and up Sheep Hill to attain the dizzy height of 330 ft and giving extensive views all over North West Surrey - well the views were there if the mist had not been in the way. The best of it is Chris apologized for taking us along 200 yards of road but explained it was to miss the muddy bit.

Being a resident of Chobham (not a native I hasten to add) it was interesting that Chris found some paths that I had not walked before. I have always considered the area to be difficult to organize walks in but Chris managed to keep on on footpaths apart from that 200 yards. True the walk was short (only ten miles) by LORR standards but it made a very nice social occasion and in any case any further would have severely tested the sense of humour of some of the walkers in those conditions.

Shedding waterproofs back at Chris's house we sat in front of a long fire to enjoy the buffet meal Margaret and Judith had prepared.

One consolation is that if Chris had not planned this walk I would have entered for the Weydon Waters. A nice walk and worth repeating in the hope of finding some better weather.

After changing in the couple of hotel bedrooms which the management had once again made available to us we joined the non-walking members - after a little confusion over recognising familiar faces in unfamiliar clothing. The staff of the Hurtwood Inn looked after 24 of us with great care and served us with a most enjoyable meal. The guest speaker was Mr Trafford Clark, Secretary of the Marleywood Control, a part of the Surrey Countryside used on both this Christmas walk and on other occasions, notably the Surrey Sprints event. He explained the philosophy of managing the open space and how the public visitors are controlled.

A thoroughly good days padlocking and portering, if that's the word, enjoyed by all participants.
