PAST EVENTS AND WALKS

THE DALES TRAVERSE

Once again Mervyn Harvey organized another splendid trip by Surrey Group to places where the Scenits exceed 1000 ft, The 28th September new Barbara Blatchford, Holly White, Chris Coates, Keith Sewitt and Richard Treson climb abourd the minibus to head for the Yorkshire Dales. On the long drive up the M1 we heard an indeterminate weather forecast and wondered quite what type of week-end we were letting ourselves in for. Asiving in Airton, just south of Kalham, a welcome seal awaited those who were noft emough to opt for bed and breakfast whilst the rain softened the campaits for Keith and Chris: Over dinner we casually mentioned our intention to walk the 25 mile traverse the next day to our landlady to be told in her broad Yorkshire accent "That cam't be right, nobody does 25 miles". Having told her about the LDWA she returned to her kitchen with besused laughter.

The next sorning the sky had cleared and we headed into Malham, set up with Ken Mayhew, and headed for the west end of Mastiles Lane to start the Traverse. As we walked over the open dales we realised that the rais had gone and the oun was coming up. Having rescued a camper van from the oud we descended to Kilnsey and Conistons. Then it was up to a superb high level limestone terrace that formed part of the ANcient Wharfdale Ridgeway. After dropping down into Kettlewell we began the long, long pull up to Buckden Pike. After lunch in the mist we dropped down to Buckden for a welcome tem (1) at the Post Office and then up and over to the next dale, through Arnoliffe and as darkness fell we finished what all agreed was a splendid walk. Apart from the distance, nearly 5000 ft of ascent reminded us of the contrast to a walk in Surrey.

Sunday sursing saw a short walk through Malham and up and over Gordale Scar. All agreed we would recomend both the Traverse (described in Strider, August 1983, p22) and Mrs Rebinson's accommodation and cooking (Lindon Bouse, Airton, Skipton, North Yorkshire, BD25 4 8E, 07293 418). PEAGLAKE 'PERITIF

Referring back to the previous 2 rambles, it is encouraging to one that the number walking prior to the evening festivities is steadily increasing. This year some 17 stalwarts, lead as oustomary by Chris Steer, set off at 10.s.m. from the car park at Peaslake to the eccompanyment of such rhubarb-rhubarb! OTHER WALKS AND ACTIVITIES IN BRIEF

David and Barbara chose a sunny November day for their Victorian Easter. Most of the 131 starters were treated to a historical lesson, with it's theme being the former Lovelace Estate and it's 19th century buildings, as they navigated their way round an 18 or 12 mile course. I say most of the starters because I understand one gave up before getting out of the door. There were 124 who were registered as having completed their chosen (or snforced) route although quite a few contravened the 4.p.m. time limit.

On the path clearing session on Eackburst Downs we again answed John Granhas - the National Trust warden - how quickly superfluous vegitation was cleared, there is still a little tidying up required, mainly do stumping, which we will be going back to do on the afternoon of 14th April - after the fun run. It is hoped the path will be waymarked shortly.

A social walk 20 miles obtaide the Surrey area and advertized as having no pub stop does not seem to be a combination to attract a good turn out. Add to this the pouring rain as we got up that morning and it was surprising that about 14 assembled in the Selbourne car park, including Boy Dilliway who had cycled more than 20 miles to get there, to walk Tom Anderson's Selbourne Expedition. This was a walk in Gilbert White country through the pouring rainbut Tom's enthusiastic love of the area was quite evident in his conversation so that we could imagine the views even if we could not see thee through the mist. We stopped at Hawkley for lunch, about 200 yards away from s pub, in spite of the advanced warming. Two took advantage of this unexpectacoasis but, such is the susceptability of man to be breinwashed into thinking be is not going to have a pub stop, most of the party mat on the seat by the church wall to eat their sandwiches with rein dripping down their necks off the yew trees. I think Ton was trying to beat Krith Chesterton's record for the middlest walk and although it was a good try, he never quite made it. Relph Eenley's winter windoor Wander went well with wh taking part on this meander through Windoor Great Park to get rid of the Christman excenses. Once again the bar of the Petters Sports Club was a welcome equivalent to the golfers 19th hole.

The Surrey Inna Kanter was held on a beautiful clear day. There were 171 taking part with 109 completing the 12 mile course while 46 completed the 18 miler. Keith Chesterton bonsts having the lowest entry fee of any event - 30 pence but even this modest our offends his modialist outlook because he is reducing the fee to 10 pence for children next year. Another feature of next years event will be the use of St Catherines bridge (currently under construction) which will mean routes can be planned further out to the est.

Unsettled weather caused more to doubt whether the Winter Tanners would take place but the day was fine enough if somewhat cold. The snow on the footpeths had laid about for a fortnight before the event making it icy to cause some problems but probably better than being mild and middy. There were 165 starters and 147 finished the 30 mile route.

THE MADAC FUN BUR LEAGUE

As predicted, after the final run in the 1954 league the LDWA finished second from bottom and with the bottom team having withdrawn for the 1955 league we are now firmly at the bottom after the first run. The start will be from Hollowsy College, Eghan at 2.30.p.m. on 31st March 1985 and as it coincides with the National Gouncil being held at the college that weekendthers will be cany resblers taking part from all parts of the country. Keith Chesterius is to lead the first days senaton from Holloway College to Sunningfale Station where the E T A is 5.p.m. Remembering some of the incidents on the Hambledon to Hambledon and route finding on the Surrey Inne Kester I do hope Keith Intends using less controversial and more penetrable paths on this occasion.

The following day (lot April) walkers start from Susm ngdale Station along Keith's London Countryway which they follow for the next 4 days. Altogether 400 miles will be in the MAs south east area including, in addition to the London Gountryway, parts of North Downs Way, Vealdway, South Downs Way, Bessex Way and Themes Walk. The daily mileage is nodest by LDMA standards and the 2000 miles will take 181 days.

The RA are anxious to see large numbers of walkers at the start and finish of the walk so do your best to get along to Bolloway College on the afternoon of March. It will be a nice "settle down" walk for those who took part in the Surrey Susmits.
