Report and Programme - October 1986

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PROGRAMME PLANNING MEETING

There were 14 who attended the meeting on 1st October. The treasurer reported the groups funds were approx £680 less an as yet unspecified loss on the Punchbowl Marathon. The treasurer explained that he must have made an error when he reported the funds to be £210 at the last meeting but even so a big contributory factor towards the healthy financial position was a large surplus on the Surrey Summits. The entry fees for the 1987 Surrey Summits have been fixed the same as those for 1986 but the organizers will do their best to ensure a large surplus does not arise again.

The treasurer also stated he will not be seeking re-election at the next AGM. Dan Hadfield, in his report in the last newsletter said this was to be his last year as chairman so this means we shall definitely need 2 new officers when the next elections take place in January. I (John Westcott) am willing to continue as secretary but having suffered me for the past 8 years, members may think its about time for a change here as well. Nominations will be called for at the AGM on 2nd January but if anybody wishes (or is willing) to stand as a candidate for one of the officer posts please let me know and I will convey this to the members at the meeting.

We again discussed having another venue for our meetings as the Lord Howard is not very suitable getting interruptions from the video loudspeakers and customers coming through on their way to the bar. We will be using the Lord Howard again for our AGM in January but 2 promising alternative venues have been suggested, Nutley Hall at Reigate and the Talbot at Ripley, and hopefully we can arrange to have our May/June meeting at one of these.

REPORT ON SURREY POINTS X-MITER 6th June 1986

Surrey groups venture into adding interest to the X-Miter by introducing a points system to the event proved disappointing in the number who turned up but popular with those who did take part. The event did not get off to a good start because Keith Cheshireton (one of the organizers) went along to the wrong hall, gained access and set things up there while Dave Challenger (the other organizer) waited with frustration at the hall as advertised. With so few customers available it seemed peculiar that the organizers should set up rival events rather than pooling their resources.

As well as points for the correct answers there were penalties for wrong ones and it would seem there were a number of appeals against some of the penalties imposed - all to no avail as the organizers decision was absolutely final. Les Rose must have created some sort of a record which will be hard to beat in finishing with minus 300 on the short course - the best positive score was 440. The results were printed in points scored order rather than the usual chronological order which meant that some of those who normally find themselves near the end of the list of finishers were this time near the top and, more significantly some of the fluster of foot found themselves near the bottom.

There were 19 who completed the 20 mile course, 9 who finished the 12 mile course and 3 took part but did not finish.

REPORT ON THE AVEBURY ESCAPEDE 27th July 1986

The response to the Avebury Escapade in July was surprising for despite the holiday season 12 members, not all Surrey Group, joined me on the day. The conditions being fine with a cool breeze - good walking weather.

REPORT ON THE CHILTERN MARATHON 14th September 1986

No doubt about it, the Middle Thames Ramblers are nearly always dead lucky weatherwise for their event. The heavens opened on the Saturday, leaving everyone in doubt about turning up for the start. The 320 who did reckoned it was the best route so far, for scenery, so quite a few told us. We favour now the checkpoint 1 being over 10 miles out which of course reduces the other 4 legs to around 4 miles each. It also has the added advantage of the later opening of that first one coupled with the 10.a.m. runners start.

There were few runners this year through "The Marveller" Orienteering event - they will have to time things differently. But what it really seems is that we will have to publish it more widely, as I believe other marathons are finding, with so many events taking place numbers are down. The Chiltern has an entry limit of 400 and has in the past managed to get this number quite easily with many disappointed would be entrants turned away but this year there were only 320 entrants and around 250 starters.

Thanks again to John Westcott in issuing the bibs, this can be a great advantage in entrants checking in, they can see who to approach. Thanks also to Dan Hadfield who kindly gave up his day to help and I trust he enjoyed the day as much as I did. We had to see a black Labrador safely back to the Marlow Dog Shop but I am sure Dan enjoyed taking him for walks.

Its now off to the 10th event, we hope to hold it on Sunday 13th September 1987 with an entirely new route and as few roads as possible.

Tuesday 4 Nov: SLIDE SHOW - TREKKING IN THE HIGH ATLAS (175). A slide show to be given by Gillian Bull. The venue is at Gillian's house GR393600. Starts at 8.p.m. Please ring Gillian if you are coming for catering purposes.

Sunday 9 Nov: EDDINGHAM RANTER (186). Start from Marindin Hall, Hillbridge GR 848422 anytime between 9 and 10.30 a.m. to finish by 4.30 p.m. Choice of 2 routes 12 or 19 miles. You devise your own route between unsupplied checkpoints from grid references given and answer a simple question about a feature at the location. You will need to bring a map, pen or pencil, compass and map case/plastic bag. There are pubs on both routes if you time yourself carefully. Entry on the day only - 50p LDWA members and 60p non members. Drinks and biscuits available at the finish. Further details (if you can think of anything) from Dan Hadfield.

Sunday 23 Nov: REIGATE ROUND (187) A ramble with Tony Youngs round Reigate rights of way (and some in Mole Valley), on the downs and in the wood, including some that have been obstructed for years. Some of the obstructions will have been removed. 22 miles. Collect an illustrated route sheet on the day. Real ale at lunchtime but bring your own food. Starts from the south side of Reigate railway station TQ 254507 at 9.a.m.

Sunday 30 Nov: PATH CLEARANCE AND SIGNPOSTING (187) It is hoped to clear a number of locations on this session mainly in the Hurleywood area. The more who turn up the more we can achieve so please make a special effort to come along. Meet at Hurleywood control car park number 5 GR 063427 at 9.30 a.m. or if you wish to come along later than this please ring Barbara Blatchford for directions to the location. Some tools will be provided but it would be helpful if you could bring some suitable tools with you - spades and saws will be useful. Please also bring your own food and drink.

Saturday 19 Dec: PEASLAKE PREAMBLE (186 & 187) The annual dinner ramble. Walk or dine or, preferably, both. The walk, led by Chris Steer starts from the Pond Lane Car Park at Peaslake (TQ 086448) at 10.a.m. We stop at the Windmill for coffee or beer, the Bricklayers Arms at Shasney Green for lunch and the old Post

Office at Share for tea, whence we return by torchlight to Penshurst, arriving at 6.p.m. or so, in good time for the ANNUAL DINNER.

Sat/Sun 4/5 April: **SURREY SUMMIT** (186-1-187) The group's main event of the year. A 100 kilometre (62 miles) challenge walk over the popular hills of central and western Surrey. A ride of 3h 45m on Saturday from Chichester Hall Village GR 947394 and 11.30 finish by 12 noon on Sunday giving a 26 hour time limit. Closing date for entries is 4th March. Sunday 26 April: **COCKING CONSTITUTIONAL - PART II** (197). Last walked in 1979.
