## SURREY SUMMITS 1990

1d8 entered, 142 started and 115 finished. The fastest finisher was George Foot in 15 hours 47 minutes, while the slowest took 25 hours 28 minutes. These times illustrate that the event continues to cater successfully for walkers of widely differing capabilities.

It is rumoured that the event made a healthy profit this year (in excess of #400) even though entries were down on 1989. This was due to Tony Cartwright obtaining a very cheap deal for the event's printing and to the more realistic entry fee that was charged this year. It is essential that events like the Summits make a profit as this helps subsidise other things the Group does eg. provide this Newsletter (the costs of which are not covered fully by members' subscriptions).

# CISSBURY CIRCUIT (by Tony Youngs)

Twenty people, including seven veterans of the 1982 expedition, enjoyed the new and improved Cissbury Circuit on 22 April 1990, a hazy but dry day. This delectable piece of open country is threatened by the proposed Worthing bypass. The Department of Transport's "preferred route" cuts across the southern tip of the Cissbury Circuit, but the Worthing Borough Council is pressing for a far more damaging route which would pass close to Cissbury Ring itself. Whether it will be worth walking the Circuit again in 1998 remains to be seen. Illustrated route sheets are still available from Tony Youngs.

#### PROBRAMME PLANNING MEETING May 10 1990

17 people attended this meeting which was held at the Prince of Wales in Shere. The Chairman in his opening address expressed the wish that these meetings should in future cover Group business as well as the Programme. The meeting received reports on previous group activities and the proposed Programme for the next 6 monthes. This information is conveyed elsewhere in this Newsletter.

John Westcott reported that there were problems getting enough helpers to man the Group's checkpoint on the Chiltern 100. It was resolved that Keith Chesterton would be the Group's co-ordinator for the checkpoint and that Jeff Ellingham would recruit additional helpers.

It was reported that John Westcott was standing down as the Surrey Summits organiser, a position he has held for P years. He was thanked for his herculanean efforts. The Surrey Summits Committee has been restructured to cover this loss (see the report elsewhere in this Newsletter).

Brian Haigh has drafted the first attempt at a Group constitution. This will be considered by a small committee who will produce a further draft which will be published in the October Newsletter. Group members will be invited to submit written comments on this subsequent draft. It is then hoped that a constitution can be agreed at the next AGM.

## BEHIND THE SCENES OF THE SURREY SUMMITS (by Louise Cartwright, Chairperson)

This report is intended to acquaint Surrey Group members with the recent changes; the activities described are mostly 'behind the scenes'. However very much at the forefront of the event's success is the dedication of the marshalls 'on the day'. The whole committee joins me in thanking all these people for their continued support.

The Surrey Summits was first walked in 1976 as a social event, and the following year it began its established tradition as a tough, walking-only, overnight, challenge event. Participants in the early years will remember the midday start under the clock in Guildford High Street, and the astonished expressions of Saturday shoppers on learning that it was not the beginning of a stroll up onto Pewley Down.

The later innovation of the walk headquarters at Witley proved popular better facilities, carparking and for the organisers a telephone and closer contact with the event at all times.

As we enter a new decade it is appropriate to explain a little about the organization of the event. It is the only Surrey event organized by a standing committee. For the past 9 years John Westcott has been the organizer with help from other committee members. The success of the walk over this period is a tribute to John, and it was with some dismay that we learned of John's resignation. For various reasons the committee had lost other members over the past few years, so it seemed timely to reappraise the situation, to invite new members to join us and to share the workload more equitably.

Jeff Ellingham becomes the event coordinator and will continue to organize the marshalls. We are pleased to welcome Martin Jones as a new committee member and the chief marshall 'on the day'. Catering remains in the capable hands of Mervyn Marvey, and following the success of the hot meal at Blackheath, our chief chef Janet Chapman has agreed to become the assistant catering officer with special responsibility for the main meal stop. Her expertise as the national publicity officer will also be a valuable asset to the event.

The appearance of the route description has received acclaim in recent years, not least from middle-aged participants who can leave their magnifying glasses at home! These people and others can be assured that Tony Cartwright will continue to use the latest technology in the pursuit of excellence.

It is the policy of the committee that some members participate in the event; all members have this choice; feedback for the 1990 event was thus provided by Liz Higgins (additionally the Summits' treasurer) and Louise Carturight. They, like many other walkers were pleased to be greeted by Dave Challenger. Dave continues his commitment to the Summits' organization by dealing with the entries for 1991. Another experienced walker, Richard Hotchkiss, has recently moved into Surrey from neighbouring Wessex; we welcome him to the committee as the member 'without portfolio'.

The whole committee meets about 3 times a year. Additionally route checking is shared, and a marshalls' walk completes the final check before the route is printed.
