WALK REPORTS.

Tale of 2 PMs, 6 Sept 92. by Tom Anderson.

The day dawned grey and ominous, soon becoming real rain. This however did not dampen the spirits of the party of enthusiasts assembled at Great Missenden. Two arrived from Southend, one arrived by train and the remainder were old survivors from my previous walks.

The walk proceeded in steady rain to Hughenden Manor, one time house of Disraeli, now owned by the National Trust and well worth a visit. We then proceeded to our lunch time stop at the Harrow, where much food was eaten (unlike last year!). After all had enjoyed this repast, low and behold it stopped raining but remained overcast. Continuing the walk took us to White Leaf Cross, where Janet Chapman was surveyed by "Market Measures" – whoever they are and what for we were unable to ascertain.

We then trudged on along the Ridgeway to Chequers, the country home of the current PM. Then on by Cymbelines Castle down to Wendover to catch the Chiltern Turbo back to Great Missenden. Many thanks to all who came, especially to Gillian Bull whose ebullient personality kept the party's morale in good shape.

Roundabout Rudgwick by Tony Youngs.

Sixteen people turned up at Cranleigh on 19 July to find that Mervyn Harvey, having worked out the route of a really rewarding ramble round Rudgwick, had taken the opportunity of a holiday in Spain, leaving a batch of route descriptions and best wishes with Colin Wood.

After some discussion about which car park Mervyn had intended us to leave from, we set out at an easy pace to walk what we thought was 21 miles. Three impatient members vanished over the horizon after three miles or so and by their speed (and a short cut or two) earned themselves an extra hour in the Blue Ship. It is a model pub: no bars and no carpets; just serving hatches, brick floors and good beer.

In mid-afternoon the hare-like half of the party pressed on in the wrong direction, catching up the tortoise-like half at half past five. Serious study of the map then revealed that seven miles of Mervyn's route remained to be walked. The whole party decided to make straight for Cranleigh and the cars.

Careful measurement on the map next day showed that we had walked almost 26 miles and that the full route was almost 28. We certainly could not complain of being given short measure. It is a very interesting route. I hope it will appear again in a future programme (with its full distance declared) and that Mervyn will lead it in person. Many thanks to Mervyn and Colin.

The Empty Coffin Walk.

10 night-owls turned up at the Juggs Arms, near Lewes, on the night of 19th June in the hope of finding the empty white coffin, written of in an early Strider (No 21). Most bolstered up their courage with alcohol from within the pub, but others knew that the night would demand all their vigilance. The quest would be more demanding than that for the perfect corn-circle and they were aware that this time the coffin might not be empty!

The Surrey Group demonstrated their wisdom, but not their courage, by staying away. 6 out of the 10 were outwith Surrey. At 11pm, the leader, grim faced Keith Chesterton, briefed his team. He said they were to have a diversion off the South Downs Way to reach their coffin at the right time.

Keith then ordered the "off". He ignored the suggestion from a walker with local knowledge that an easy path should be used and led the way up a steep slippy path through a dark wood. He wanted to test his group. After 2 hours on the moonlit tops, they reached a narrow road and an angry farmer, who demanded to know why they were using a track that was not a right of way. Here the leader showed why he was a leader and disappeared down another path, leaving his followers to provide the explanation. Later Keith said he had felt this track was a better route and no-one would be about at that time of night!

Soon they reached the road near Rodmell and the site of the empty coffin. This time there was no coffin. Keith said perhaps Virginia Woolf's spirit was now at rest, or perhaps her relatives were dead and could no longer put the coffin out. (John Hillaby had suggested the original sighting of the coffin had been on the anniversary of her death).

So the trek continued - with a snack stop by Southease church and a drinks stop in the drizzle at Alfriston. The leader said he'd walked it before, but seemed unsure of the way. He then admitted that his previous walk had been 21 years ago, but that it was one of his favourites.

In Friston forest, the bad news was received that one of the 10 had strained his knee and could not walk any further. In traditional Surrey Group spirit the team decided to leave him behind and carry on. On the Seven Sisters stretch, they were too late for the dawn, but in time for a gale force wind to walk into. On this last stretch into Eastbourne, Keith rushed on ahead foran early breakfast, 4 stopped to rest and 4 from the original 10 finished the walk together. Our leader said this was a good average for his social walks and he couldn't understand why he hadn't had more walkers. He said that they may not have found the coffin, but they had passed the entrance test for next year's Cleveland 100. On that they might see the dog that did not bark!
