By tracks well known to Sunsey events aficionados we made our way to Witley Station on a clear bright blue day, shortly passing a walking stick factory and, by a tarmac path through a copse to grassland fields, shop and another wood to the outskirts of Chiddingfold. We came out onto the Green where the writer, who happened to be the leader for the day, pointed out a suitable coffee shop but no permission to stop being forthcoming we continued up Pockford Road (previously known as Vann Lane) and by further field and woodland tracks, hopelessly muddied but under a blue sky we made our way through Botany Bay, a large area of forestry. More wet and muddy woodland tracks, a bit of tarmac and four big fields led us to the Shillingstone Golf Course and, not long after, the Ram's Nest Inn. Report : An Ashdown Amble : Tuesday 12 April 1997

I thought I had retired from leading LDWA social Walks but when one or two Winnie the Pooh fans (some people never grow up) welcomed the suggestion of a mid-week walk in Ashdown Forest, of a distance suitable for the unperambulated, I found myself back in the old routine.

Nine of us set out in the sunshine from Broadstone picnic site and made for the Heffalump Trap, the Enchanted Place (known to the Ordnance Survey as Gills Lap) and the memorial to the perpetrators of it all, A A Milne and E H Shepard. We then put away childish things, bagged the highest point of the Forest, Greenwood Gate Clump, and found the Forest's two waterfalls and one of its few pubs, the Foresters Arms at Fairwarp. We had been there a good 20 minutes when we were joined by Don Bohon of the London Group and Jim Dunster of ours. They had found the start but had been delayed by heavy traffic. Pity they missed the Enchanted Place.

After lunch, now a party of eleven, we visited the "Airmen's Grave", a touching memorial to the crew of a Wellington that came to grief here returning from a sortie to bomb Cologne in July 1941. We then completed the walk returning by way of Nutley Windmill and the ice cream van at Millbrook East car park.

My thanks to those who turned up. It was good to be on a Surrey Group walk once again.
